In our health sector, we acquired Namuna Community Hospital (NCH) in Lamjung and have been able to provide quality health care services to the poor by equipping the hospital with more staff, new equipment, and other improvements. Through the support of our partner, BMS World Mission, we have been able to embark on a unique Organizational Capacity and Strengthening journey to bring about better structures and systems within our organization.



ALL IS WELL THAT ENDS WELL



Anuj, a 12-year-old boy lives with his mother and his 16-year-old sister. Both the sister and brother look out for each other as they do not have a father and their mother has a hearing impairment. After spending a few days enduring pain in his stomach, Anuj and his sister arrived at Chaurjahari Hospital complaining of severe stomach pain. After performing an ultrasound the hospital staff discovered that his appendix had ruptured and he required immediate surgery.

Our doctors advised his sister to take him to a bigger hospital for surgery and treatment. His sister broke down crying as they were not economically sound and she was worried about how she would pay for his treatment. She felt completely helpless as she was only a 16-year-old teenager; too young to be aware and knowledgeable to take care of her brother. However, our hospital staff took notice of their situation and helped them by coordinating with the Chaurjahari Municipality office to provide an ambulance to take them to the better equipped hospital. Anuj was able to make the journey to better health with his sister as we provided them with necessary financial support and arrangements for his treatment.

After spending three months in recovery, the duo came to thank our hospital staff for their timely support and help in saving his life. Anuj's story is one of many who could have potentially lost their life if timely treatment was not made available to them; a common occurrence and story in remote areas of the mid-western hills of Nepal.

A FORTUNATE ENDING

Manama's story is one of many stories shared by women in the rural villages of Nepal. Manama works in other people's homes doing household work to earn money to feed her family. Her duty starts early in the morning, before sunrise, when she goes to the field to cut grass for her cattle. It was one unfortunate early morning when she got bitten by a snake on her left hand. While still in shock and disbelief, she demonstrated quick thinking by pulling the snake off her hand and immediately tied her hand with her shawl to prevent the snake's venom from spreading. However, like many in the villages, instead of rushing to a hospital for medical treatment, habitually her family took her to a shaman for a remedy and relief for her snake bite. In four days, her hands started to swell and she was not able to do anything due to her debilitation. The village chairperson who had seen her often working in other people's homes took notice of her absence and visited her. When he saw her hand infected, he immediately advised her to go to our Chaurjahari Hospital.

When she arrived at our hospital, we noticed her left hand had gangrene due to prolonged application of a tourniquet. She was immediately admitted at our hospital and regularly treated for her hand, which took three weeks to recover. Manama is one of the lucky ones who came in time to the hospital and was able to save her hand. We have seen many such cases in previous years where women and men had to have a limb amputated due to severe decomposition after misquided shaman treatment over snake wounds.



GHCGunjaman Singh Hospital Chitwan

The Gunjaman Singh Hospital (GHC), a 50 bed hospital, is located in Pithuwa, Ratnanagar 14, Chitwan provides affordable and quality health care services to people living in remote parts of Chitwan and Makwanpur districts who travel long hours on foot to access these services. GHC provides OPD, IPD, orthopaedic, MDGP, physiotherapy, pharmaceutical, diagnostic, emergency and eye care services to mainly the impoverished people from Chepang, Dalit, Janajati, Tharu, and Madhesi ethnicities.

HEALING BONES



A nine year old girl Heena Praja fell and hurt herself on a gardening tool causing a fracture in her left arm. Since her family were aware and knowledgeable about our hospital, they rushed her there for treatment.

An x-ray revealed that she had sustained a greenstick fracture - cracks and breaks in the bone rather than shattering of the bone; a common type of fracture sustained by children at the tender age below 10 years. Thankfully, since GHC offers orthopedic services and we have the qualified and competent staff to help with such issues, we were able to immobilize the fracture and provide care to the 9 year old girl. Afterwards, she and her family were provided with counselling and emotional support as well as general health education on hygiene and caring for her condition. After several days of treatment and providing health education to her family we were able to discharge her.

CARING FOR SUNNY MAYA



Sunny Maya, a 75-year-old woman from Gorkha District, several hours away and north of Chitwan District, arrived at our Gunjaman Singh Hospital with complaints of itching and pain all over her body. She had red patches and black crusting on her skin. Due to her condition she had not been eating properly for about 2 months and was unable to walk without support. At first, she had visited a hospital in Gorkha and was prescribed certain medication. Despite that her condition worsened day by day. Her family then heard about the dermatology services at our hospital in Chitwan and decided to bring her for treatment.

After assessing her, our doctor provided a proper diagnosis of her condition (impetigo) and was treated for 5 days with IV antibiotics and topical ointments. During her stay she was provided with health education on hygiene and sanitation, and common diseases and advised on a diet plan. She was then discharged after being without pain and recovering well.



This past year was an opportune and privileged time for HDCS to have acquired Namuna Community Hospital, enabling us to continue providing quality health care services to the people of Lamjung. With the support of our partners and friends, we are happy to report on the accomplishments at NCH within a span of 6.5 months. NCH caters mostly to the disenfranchised people in Sundarbazar Municipality, Lamjung, and people from neighbouring Tanahun District.

AN AXE TO GRIND A 72-year old's experience of modern medicine.



Dil Bahadur Gurung, a 72-year-old man, was felling some trees in his village and, in doing so, sustained a deep axe wound on his knee. Even as Dil resisted and refused to visit a hospital to get timely treatment, his daughter and grandson, after finally convincing him, rushed him to our Namuna Community Hospital.

Even though he got admitted at our hospital, it was very difficult to convince him to take medicines as this was the first time he had ever been admitted to a hospital and he did not trust nor understand the importance of modern medicine in healing and recovery of his wounds. As he was very stubborn and refused to take any injections and medications, it was felt that he should be counselled about the benefits and importance of medicines and how the treatment

would help him on to a faster path to recovery. In doing so, we were slowly able to administer him the much-needed medicines and provide him with the treatment he desperately needed.

He finally recovered after spending six days at our hospital. With a smile on his face he confessed, "As I speak a different local village dialect and am not very fluent in Nepali, I wasn't sure how to communicate with doctors and staff at the hospital, so I was reluctant to visit. I also find it easy and convenient to take herbal concoctions whenever I was unwell. But now I am happy and convinced to take medicines after coming to Namuna Hospital and recovering fully after six days."

His daughter was also overjoyed to see her father recovered and exclaimed, "Thank you, Namuna Hospital family, for taking care of my father and bringing him back to good health. His mindset and attitude have finally changed towards modern medicine. He now understands why the medicines are good for him thanks to the care and treatment he received."

NANIMAYA FINDS HOPE



Nanimaya arrived at our health camp to receive a general health checkup but when she learned that there is also a mental health counselling station, she decided to receive counselling.

During her session she revealed that she had mental health issues from early childhood. Due to her parents fighting constantly, there was unrest at home and the environment among all her other siblings (11 of them) was not peaceful and filled with strife and sadness. She also stated that five of her sisters took medication for their mental health issues.

She was troubled by her familial situation but had to take care of herself and she knew that she too suffered from mental health issues but was afraid to talk to

anyone about it and bring her condition to light out of fear of discrimination and stigmatisation of having a mental health disorder.

But at the health camp she was eager and happy to finally speak up about her mental health issues. She stated that she will no longer hide her emotions and suffering and seek to face it openly in the coming days.

She testified, "I felt that I was carrying a huge burden and that I was troubled and had a serious mental health issue but after my counselling session today I have learnt and understood more about mental health and now the burden in my heart feels lighter."

ABBS — Asha Bal Bikas Sewa



Asha Bal Bikas Sewa (ABBS) meaning Hope for Child Development Services, operates two special needs education centers in Kathmandu and Chitwan District for children with intellectual and physical disabilities. It also runs a community-based rehabilitation program in West Rukum District with 472 contacts with the aim to integrate persons living with a disability back to their families, community, and society through skill development, awareness, and training.

ABBS provides life skills education and several therapies according to the needs of each child at their centers to aid them towards becoming independent and self-reliant as far as possible. Children who are unable to attend the center regularly are supported with online classes and home visits.

This past year ABBS, through training and counseling, equipped parents to have a better understanding of the various kinds of disabilities, so they are able to aid in the interaction, growth, and development of their children. ABBS also initiated birthday celebrations for each student to create a loving and compassionate environment and carried out regular sports activities to boost the morale and improve hand-eye coordination and cognitive development of the children.

SUPPORTING PARENTS WITH MENTAL HEALTH PROBLEMS



Madhu Karki is the mother of a student at ABBS, who also suffers from mental health problems. Due to her mental health issues, she is not able to work consistently to provide for her family. During home visits, the ABBS teachers learned that her mental health was deteriorating due to lack of treatment. ABBS teachers coordinated with a mental health institution to provide her with counseling and effective treatment for a whole month. Since then (January 2023), ABBS teachers have been supporting Madhu with medicines and treatments and counseling.

KISC PRIMARY & SECONDARY

Kathmandu International Study Centre

Kathmandu International Study Centre (KISC) comprises of three branches: KISC Primary, KISC Secondary and KISC Education Quality Improvement Programme (KISC EQUIP). New Heads for each of these branches were appointed to support the Director in leading the school into the next phase. The aim at KISC is to provide excellent education and opportunities for good quality educational practice, build up skills, knowledge and positive attitudes in education. It prides itself on a holistic educational philosophy and experience, where the process of learning is as important as actual achievement. Furthermore, KISC strives to provide students with opportunities to develop their gifts and talents through as many aspects of school life as possible: academically, socially and through sports and creative arts.

TRANSFORMING LEARNING THROUGH EFFECTIVE RESOURCES

KISC EQUIP provided Early Childhood Development (ECD) facilitator, Krishna Kumari Basnet Bista, at Bijayswari Basic School in Rukum West with essential resources such as teaching materials, carpets, cushions, and furniture for her classroom. These materials have not only created a beautiful learning space but have also become a source of pride for the students who now declare that they have the best classroom in the entire school. ECD facilitator Krishna also testified that it has also led to substantial increase in student attendance.

A LITTLE HELP GOES A LONG WAY

Rajesh Chepang, a 4th Grade student comes from an impoverished home and would often attend school on an empty stomach. His caring teachers ensured that he received snacks and some food at school. Due to his poor background, KISC EQUIP provided him with a scholarship and stationery which enabled him to continue receiving an education and some sustenance to keep him well fed. This hand of support enabled his siblings to also attend school. Rajesh has beaten all the odds by not only overcoming his malnutrition but has also excelled as one of the top students in his class.

ENCOURAGING QUALITY EDUCATION

The principal of Land Star School said, "I want to thank KISC EQUIP for organizing this science exhibition. It has really been very beneficial for our students. I have been wanting to organize such an event for a long time and finally KISC EQUIP made it possible in our school. I am excited to see what the students of different schools have done. I can see students developing communication skills while they explain and speak about their work confidently."

TEACHING PHONICS

To enable teachers of all subjects and grades realize the benefits of teaching phonics to their students, EQUIP was able to provide school-based phonics training to 104 teachers from seven partner schools in the month of February 2023. One of the participants said, "I'm from a government school and so I have difficulty in speaking English, especially pronouncing long words. I have to go to a dictionary to know how to pronounce these words, but it is not easy. I was unaware of phonics before, but this session has helped me a lot. It was very fruitful, and I learnt many new things. I hope that phonics will help me to speak English more confidently and that I can help my students to learn better."



CoRIN

Community Radio Initiative Nepal



The work of CoRIN started 15 years ago, with Dadeldhura Afno FM being the first radio station established. Our radio stations have proven to be an effective channel of promoting health messages, advocating for rights, and disseminating information regarding animal husbandry and traditional farming in order to enhance lives. Our radio produces packaged information that targets children, the elderly, students, farmers, and persons living with a disability.

Presently, CoRIN operates via Afno FM radio stations in Dadeldhura, Okhaldhunga, Chitwan, and Rukum and via Asha FM in Janakpur. Our radio programs are available online for anyone around the world to tune into at www.afnofm.org.







CHITWAN

Chitwan radio celebrated their 2nd anniversary together with 20 youth and social workers by providing an opportunity for kitchen gardening, radio and youth awareness training. As part of the celebration, 2 wheelchairs distributed were needy men in Pipaltar Municipality. The Chepang radio station in Chitwan been instrumental broadcasting radio programs on information, health, awareness and empowerment specifically for the growth development of the Chepang community in Kalika Municipality.

DADELDHURA

Afno FM Dadeldhura celebrated its 15th anniversary with 138 prisoners. We provided motivational books to the prisoners and three Sonset (solar powered) radios, five wooden beds, some fruit and meat for their meals. It was an opportune time to be a living witness of God's love to all. We also visited a children's home and provided some stationery and groceries for them.

JANAKPUR

Our Janakpur radio, Naya Asha FM, went live on air on the 16th of December 2022. Naya Asha, meaning New Hope, was aptly named to provide and bring new hope to people who are marginalized and suffering.

OKHALDHUNGA RUKUM

Afno FM Okhaldunga celebrated the completion of its 14th year of broadcasting, so we decided to honor 15 farmers from 15 different wards. Some farmers among them testified that they had begun their farming business after listening to our radio programs and learning from it. As part of our celebration we also distributed fruit to patients in Okhaldhunga Hospital and prisoners at the District Jail.

Afno FM Rukum celebrated their 6th year of serving the local community. The celebration took place in the capital of West Rukum District, Musikot. The Chief District Officer (CDO) has asked us to provide encouragement and support to the prisoners in the District Jail. Therefore, we provided motivational books written by highly successful people. We also provided fruit, 3 oximeters and five SonSet radios to the 156 prisoners.



CBR

Community Based Rehabilitation Rukum Program

The CBR program is designed to integrate persons living with a disability (PwD) back to their families, community, and society through skill development, awareness, and training. The program has helped create greater awareness regarding types of disabilities and their causes, to remove superstitious beliefs that a disability is caused due to the sins of their past life. CBR networks with 14 local groups such as mothers groups, disability groups, and local youth groups for disability awareness and coordinating and facilitating better outcomes for rehabilitation of PwDs in society.

ACHIEVEMENTS

MCH — Mother and Child Health Promotion Project

HDCS's Mother and Child Health Promotion project is implemented in 6 municipalities of West Rukum District. The primary focus is to provide health education and awareness to mothers in 144 mothers groups. Apart from working with women, the project also strives to increase awareness among men in the community, school teachers and students regarding maternal and child health issues, child marriage and teenage pregnancies. The project also works to strengthen the local capacity of government health personnel through regular support and training.

FROM FEAR TO EMPOWERMENT

Jahana was pushed into adulthood and its responsibilities sooner than she imagined when she got married at the tender age of 18. Two years into her marriage, she discovered that she was expecting her first child. This plagued her with confusion and uncertainty since the intricacies of pregnancy, ante-natal care and motherhood were alien concepts to her. She also felt caged by her shame as she was uncomfortable to speak up and believed these topics should remain private matters, not to be discussed in public.

In that moment, hope entered her life in the form of Gopa Lamicchane, a compassionate social mobilizer for the HDCS–MCH project. Gopa encouraged her to remain calm during her pregnancy and informed her about the project's monthly Ama Surakshya (Safe Motherhood) classes. Jahana eagerly enrolled in the classes and participated well. She gained invaluable knowledge about family planning, antenatal care, and post-natal care. The classes not only equipped her with essential information but also gave her the confidence to shed the shame she had once felt.

Armed with her newfound knowledge and a supportive network, Jahana was no longer reluctant, she diligently attended her ante-natal care visits and maintained a nutritious diet.



Her transformation was nothing short of remarkable, as she blossomed into a poised and informed mother-to-be.

She gave birth to a healthy child at HDCS Chaurjahari Hospital but her journey to transformative motherhood didn't end there. She continued to prioritize the health of her baby and herself by attending post-natal check ups and now cherishes every moment of her experience, embracing the joys and challenges of motherhood with confidence.

She testifies, "Thank you HDCS for taking away my shame, fear, and discomfort related to pregnancy and motherhood. Thank you for making my motherhood an encouraging and enjoyable journey."

Jahana's story serves as a testimony for the transformative power of education, community support and empowerment. Her journey from uncertainty to confidence is a shining example of how informed and empowered mothers can create a brighter future for themselves and their children.

WALI **WASH and Livelihood**

HDCS's WASH and Livelihood project is based in West Rukum district. The project aims to support children and their families to improve their health, nutrition and economic status.

The WASH component of the project implements the Seven Flags Approach for Total Sanitation (7FATS) which equips schools with WASH education, gender-segregated and disability-friendly toilets, while also improving access to water by constructing drinking water and hand-washing facilities.

The livelihood aspect focuses on providing knowledge and training to farmers and mothers on agriculture, livestock and financial management, whilst enabling market access to improve their socioeconomic status. This helps parents to meet their children's basic nutritional needs, healthcare and education.

I'm Isha Pun and I had the privilege of attending a three-day animal husbandry training provided by HDCS. After the training I took out a loan of NPR 8,000 (USD 60) from the project and purchased two baby goats and started my goat farming business. After a year of rearing them I was able to sell them and make a profit of NPR 25,000 (USD 188).

I'm thankful that this training provided a wonderful opportunity to learn about livestock management and trade. This has helped my family of 5 meet our basic needs and also have enough for our expenses. We are now better financially and are grateful for it. This initiative has not only saved me from financial hardships but also inspired hope for a better future. I sincerely hope that this program continues its support to people like me and uplifts the living standards of people in Rukum.

YADHU RANA'S TESTIMONY



Yadu Rana, is the principal of Shital Secondary School in Chaurjahari, West Rukum. He wanted to thank HDCS and their partners for the support the school has received over the years in this testimony:

Through HDCS's School WASH project and the 7FATS, our school over the years has received support in WASH awareness, education, and infrastructure. We now have six well-equipped and modern toilets, handwashing and safe drinking water facilities.

These changes have brought about a positive impact on the school children as many of them are stricken with poverty and lack these basic facilities at home. These provisions have enabled the school to provide a sanitary and positive learning environment for the development of these children whilst enabling good health and hygiene.

MEHR Medical Emergency and Health Response

The Medical Emergency and Health Response (MEHR) project began its implementation in February 2023 in 10 municipalities within three different districts: Jajarkot, Salyan and Rukum West. This is a three-year project which will establish a local Medical Emergency Team (MET) and improve the emergency health services and response in the region through HDCS's Chaurjahari Hospital Rukum (CHR).

Furthermore, the project aims to capacitate and strengthen the local emergency response bodies and systems such as the local government, police, and youth and health personnel by providing basic first aid training, ambulance system management, and providing skills for the mobilization of local resources to efficiently respond to disasters and emergency situations.







A WAI K TO REMEMBER

Dhanush is a 73-year-old man who had been suffering from leg pain for over two weeks and was only able to walk with the help of crutches. Due to his poor financial condition, he had never visited a hospital. One day, on HDCS's Afno FM radio, he heard about a free health camp in his area organized by HDCS and requested his son to take him to the camp.

The doctors at the camp examined him and diagnosed him with arthritis and prescribed the needed medication. After taking the medicines and some rest his pain dissipated and he was able to stand unaided. With joy he expressed his gratitude, "I am now able to stand up on my own feet. The free health camp enabled me to receive needed treatment. I want to thank HDCS for their hard work and for providing access to quality health care and treatment to people like me in remote areas of West Rukum."

ONE HEALTH

The project began in May 2023 and will be implemented in West Rukum District. The project will apply the concept of One Health which describes the close link, relationship and interaction between human health, animal health and environmental health

HDCS seeks to bring about optimized and balanced healthy ecosystems, healthy animals, and healthy humans through practical programmatic implementation of the concept among the general population with special focus on community sections such as schools, farmers groups, and mothers groups.

In the coming days, HDCS will work towards raising awareness of the concept and help communities realize the important of taking care of each sector to ultimately enhance their health and wellbeing and improve their livelihood.

Project activities will be closely linked to HDCS's Kotjahari Organic Farm where a Model One Health Farm will be set up to provide practical examples of applying the concept to bring about healthier communities. This project is first of its kind to be implemented at the community level and pivotal to understanding and preventing outbreaks of disease and perhaps another pandemic.



DISASTER MANAGEMENT

This past year we started two new disaster-related projects in the neighbouring districts of Manang and Lamjung:

The Forecast Based Emergency Response (FOREBER) project focuses on developing community-led 'Anticipatory Action' to enhance the coping capacity of vulnerable communities before and during disasters. This is carried out in select communities that are identified as vulnerable to disasters like flood, landslide, Glacial Lake Outbursts (GLOFs).

The Namuna Community Preparedness Project (NCPP) focuses on empowering people in communities, particularly young people, to learn about disaster preparedness and response in order to effectively prepare and respond to a disaster when it occurs in the hope of creating resilient communities.



FOREBER

Forecast Based Emergency Response



27 representatives from Nepal Army, APF, Nepal Police and community youth received Search and Rescue training in Manang. The training covered the following topics: rope handling and rescue techniques, fire control and medical first responder and general emergencies.



Geological survey (landslide susceptibility study) carried out of two landslides in Chailung and Sikhre of Dordi Rural Municipality, Lamjung.



2,000 sq m plastic sheets provided for temporary protection of landslide in Sikhre, Lamjung.



For dengue prevention, **515** mosquito nets to poor and vulnerable

families and **50** nets were provided to NCH hospital. Hoarding board was installed and radio messages were also disseminated.

NCPP

Namuna Community Preparedness Project



Equipped 4 wards in Sundarbazar, Lamjung, with disaster stock.



11 ward officers orientated on climate change adaptation and disaster risk reduction, basic first aid training, patient transfer, fire extinguisher and tent building training and also on using local materials to build temporary shelters.



Namuna Community Hospital staff trained and equipped on fire extinguisher use, tent building and core humanitarian standards.



Established a Creation Care garden to promote environmental care and sustainability.


